Have you heard the expression *your money is burning a hole in your pocket?* Have you heard it said I'm so broke I can't rub two nickels together? We know there are spenders and savers. You see the two ditches. What about love? The Lord said, "Love your neighbor as yourself." But He also

said, "The love of money is the root of all evil."

As I lie in my bed I'm thinking, "Lord, give me confidence in living out my Christian life." Then I think, "Help me not let that confidence become arrogance." I think, "Lord, help me be humble as I face my day." The ditch is wanting to do penance, as if beating yourself up over your missed steps makes you humble.

Here are a few more examples. Lord, give me discernment. This is a gift but we have to be careful we do not become too critical or think we know more than we do. Have you heard this expression - There are three sides to a story. Your side, my side and the right side. I think most people think they have the gift of discernment, but do they? Many, when asked if they are a Christian, say yes, but the question is who is your Jesus? The Mormons say they are Christians but do not adhere to the Jesus of the Bible. The Jehovah Witnesses say they are Christians but their Jesus is not God.

Back to the Bible verses I started with. We need to strive, not strife, to enter in at the straight gate. If you have never read the book *Pilgrims Progress* I highly recommend it. In the book, Christian heads off to the Celestial City. He travels down a road that many travel and along the way he meets many types of people and experiences many of the wrong roads and ditches we all face in our Christian walk. Hopefully, this small article born from one of my bad night's sleep gives you some food for thought and prayer the next time your brain takes off, 100 miles an hour, when you're trying to sleep.

hen we consider immortality, as Christians our minds usually drift toward heaven and all that encompasses.

This immortality, purchased for us by Christ's blood, contains an eternality that extends beyond this time-defined existence we know. But there is also an immortality that is not eternal. It is limited in effect to this age, this existence before Christ rolls up the scroll of time forever. It extends at best only as far as time itself. This is where the world often gets stuck in their thinking, desiring to earn an earthly fame that will "immortalize" them in the eyes of men. Because it is so often encased in selfish ambition, Christians can tend to dismiss any such pursuit as worldly and carnal. And that could be true, but it is not universally true.

Take Peter, for example. At the writing of his second epistle, he knows his time on earth is coming to a swift end and he is very concerned for his sheep, that they not be led astray or deceived. "I think it right, as long as I am in this body, to stir you up by way of reminder, since I know that the putting off of my body will be soon, as our Lord Jesus Christ made clear to me. And I

will make every effort so that after my departure you may be able at any time to recall these things." (2Pe 1:13-15) There is a resonating ache for some earthly immortality for the benefit of the people he loves so dearly. He realizes he and all the others who actually knew Christ in His humanity are dying off, and there will be no one left to remind Christ-followers of who it is they are following and how to do it. But what makes his desire for this type of immortality noble where for so many others it is anything but noble is this - he is not earnest that his name be immortalized, only His message. This is actually a pretty good litmus test of sincerity for ourselves and those we encounter, helping us to judge rightly.

Peter used two means of obtaining such immortality - example and exposition. He lived the message; he spoke the message; and he wrote the message. Let us consider both our motives and our means of preserving the particular understanding and faith Christ has entrusted to each of us. What is it we want to be remembered - our message or our name? Is our example consistent with our message? What are we doing to preserve it for those who will come after us? It is not an inappropriate thing to consider in this breath of time we have on this earth.
